


ST STEPHEN'S HOME SERVICE – SUNDAY 24th MAY 2020

NEW TESTAMENT READING (Acts 1:6-14)

So when they had come together, they asked him, "Lord, is this the time when you will restore the kingdom to Israel?" He replied, "It is not for you to know the times or periods that the Father has set by his own authority. But you will receive power when the Holy Spirit has come upon you; and you will be my witnesses in Jerusalem, in all Judea and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth." When he had said this, as they were watching, he was lifted up, and a cloud took him out of their sight. While he was going and they were gazing up toward heaven, suddenly two men in white robes stood by them. They said, "Men of Galilee, why do you stand looking up toward heaven? This Jesus, who has been taken up from you into heaven, will come in the same way as you saw him go into heaven."

Then they returned to Jerusalem from the mount called Olivet, which is near Jerusalem, a sabbath day's journey away. When they had entered the city, they

went to the room upstairs where they were staying ... and they were constantly devoting themselves to prayer.

GOSPEL READING (John 17:1-6,11)

REFLECTION

Pity Jesus' disciples! What an emotional roller-coaster of a ride the past few weeks had been for them! First the triumph of Palm Sunday, with Jesus being acclaimed by the crowds. Then watching the wheels coming off as the authorities, already hostile, had arrested him under cover of dark, tried



him in a kangaroo court and had the Romans do the dirty work of putting him to an agonising and humiliating death. The disciples' own horror at Jesus' death, their fear for their own lives and guilt for having abandoned him to his fate. Then the rumours that Jesus was alive again, and – amazingly! – there he was, more alive than ever. A kind of 'new normal' emerging as they enjoyed days in the sun with Jesus: no talk of suffering or death now.

And then he is gone again, taken into heaven before their eyes, this time with no promise of a happy reunion anytime soon. Instead, he leaves them with a strange promise about some mysterious helper on the way: can't make any sense of that! Oh, and the small matter of a job to do – nothing less than to tell their story throughout the whole sceptical world. This promised helper had better be good at his job!

Perhaps right now we can sympathise more than ever with that sense of being on an emotional rollercoaster? From the first few anxious weeks when the Covid story was unfolding, we've watched with horror as the virus spread. Tens of thousands have died, millions have been infected, countless people's livelihoods are in the balance; we've been confined to our homes, unable to meet close family, unable even to mourn the loss of loved ones in the usual way. Our hopes have been lifted, then dropped, repeatedly. Now we are moving from a time of at least some certainty into one of guesswork and "common sense"; only we all know common sense will not be enough. Little wonder that pretty much everyone I talk to is feeling emotionally wrung-out.

And as a Church we feel we want to do more to help – of course we do. But what can we do? How can we as Church continue to reach out amidst all these restrictions? We know that, like those first disciples, we have a mission – the same mission, to make known to the world the love of God in Christ. But how can we be up to the task?

What did those early disciples do faced with their own period of uncertain waiting?

They stuck together, and they prayed.

The climax of Jesus' great prayer in John's Gospel for all his followers is, "that they may be one, heavenly Father, as we are one." Christian unity is for Jesus the best evidence to the world at large of the reality of his message. Let's be clear: Jesus wasn't commending a holy-huddle mentality, but a genuine,

practical care for each other which overflows in care for the wider community and world, and which makes a profound impression on all who see it. Is it ironic to be talking about Christian unity when we can't meet together? Not at all. We are still very much one body: we are just finding new ways of expressing that. As one person said to me, we need to find out how to practise **sociable** distancing.

And prayer. Stephen reflected last week on the importance of using the time we now have as an opportunity to get praying. Earlier in the week I circulated a cycle of prayer which may help you focus your praying. We are looking at starting regular prayer on Zoom. But whether you do it on Zoom, or do it by yourself, the key thing (in the words of the motto of the sports brand, Nike) is: "Just do it!"

Next week we will celebrate Pentecost, when we remember and give thanks for God's gift to the Church of His Spirit – not just once, but in every generation, including ours. The Spirit is given to us to be our helper and guide in the task of following in Jesus' steps, and sharing the good news about him in a world hungering for spiritual reality. If anyone can make sense of these rollercoaster times, and bring us through – changed, maybe humbled, but trusting more in God's grace and strength – if anyone can help us through these upside-down times, it is Him. Our job is to stick together, to love the world, and to pray.
