INTRODUCTION

We can choose to follow that example quite literally by supporting the work of our local foodbank, and we can also join in with the broader work at hand by seeking to satisfy the bigger hungers of our world. Whether that be hunger for justice,



hunger for freedom, hunger for peace or hunger for compassion.

Everything that Jesus did during his ministry here on earth came from a place of compassion followed frequently by action or by a call to action. And our Gospel reading today is full of activity. Jesus feeds the disciples but it's the disciples in turn that feed the crowds.

We too are called to follow this example. But the anguish expressed by Paul in his letter to the Romans tells us something of our human nature. It can be all too easy to sometimes think we can manage quite nicely on our own, either by forgetting or by ignoring our need of Christ. Christ the compassionate, Christ the one who – if we would only listen - compels us to action in the service of our brothers and sisters.

So pause for a moment to ask yourself: "What I am I hungry for?" "Where can I see a hunger that compels my heart and hands to action?"

GOSPEL READING (Matthew 14:13-21 NRSV)

Now when Jesus heard this, he withdrew from there in a boat to a deserted place by himself. But when the crowds heard it, they followed him on foot from the towns. When he went ashore, he saw a great crowd; and he had compassion for them and cured their sick. When it was evening, the disciples came to him and said, "This is a deserted place, and the hour is now late; send the crowds away so that they may go into the villages and buy food for themselves." Jesus said to them, "They need not go away; you give them something to eat." They replied, "We have nothing here but five loaves and two fish." And he said, "Bring them here to me." Then he ordered the crowds to sit down on the grass. Taking the five loaves and the two fish, he looked up to heaven, and

blessed and broke the loaves, and gave them to the disciples, and the disciples gave them to the crowds. And all ate and were filled; and they took up what was left over of the broken pieces, twelve baskets full. And those who ate were about five thousand men, besides women and children.

REFLECTION (by Andy Todd)

The world is hungry.



The world is hungry for food. The charity *Mercy Corps* estimates that, in 2020, 821 million people globally do not have enough of the food they need to live an active, healthy life. One in every nine people goes to bed hungry each night. Some 98 per cent of those people live in so-called developing countries.

But even in the UK, *Fareshare* believes that around 8.4 million people

(equivalent to the entire population of London) are struggling to afford to eat; and more than half of those regularly experience physical hunger.

The world is hungry for justice. This year we have seen thousands, perhaps millions of people worldwide taking a stand against racial injustice. *Open Doors* calculates that 260 million Christians live in regime where they are at risk of high, or very high, or extreme levels of persecution. The *Walk Free Foundation* estimated that in 2018 there were about 40.3 million people in forms of modern slavery around the world.

The world is hungry for a sense of meaning, community and belonging. Even, or perhaps especially, in the affluent Western world, study after study shows that people feel dislocated and unsatisfied with their lives. Many are asking themselves, in Isaiah's words, "Why do you spend your money for that which does not feed you, and your labour for what does not satisfy?" (Isaiah 55:2)

The world is hungry.



Stop for a moment, look inside yourself, and ask, "How does knowing this make me feel?"

My guess would be – a sense of heartache. A mixture of compassion; an impulse to try to do something; and a sense of helplessness in the face of such overwhelming problems.

Hold those feelings a moment, and come with me to join Jesus' disciples at the end of a long, tiring day, as they look at the thousands of people milling around, far from the nearest village, and begin to think, "They must be hungry: where are they going to get food? (PS: we are hungry, too!)"

So they put this to Jesus. Perhaps (they think) his mind is elsewhere, and he hasn't spotted how late it is getting.

His response? "You give them something to eat."

"What, us?? How can we possibly help? We've only brought these five small loaves and two fish – barely enough for our own dinner!"

"Bring them here to me."

Like you and me, Jesus' disciples felt compassion, an impulse to help, and a sense of helplessness. If they had stopped there, there might have been 5,000 very hungry people that evening. But then they gave what they had to Jesus, and somehow – miraculously – the hungry were fed.

Could this be a pattern for you and me today, faced with a mountain of hunger in our world?

We experience a sense of heartache at the pain we see around us and within us, near and far. As St Paul discovered when he agonised over the stubborn refusal of his contemporaries to see that Jesus was their promised Messiah, that heartache is not to be dismissed: it is an echo of God's own heartache for his world. We feel compassion and long for the hungry to be fed, for justice to be done, for all to find meaning and belonging. And Jesus' challenge comes to us: "You feed them. You be part of the answer."

Then the sense of helplessness: "I'm too old – or too young; I don't have the time, I don't have the energy; I don't have the skills or the experience or the confidence. I've only got these five small loaves and two fish. It's not enough."

But Jesus isn't expecting us to feed the world or right its wrongs by ourselves. He is asking us to place what we have at his disposal, and allow him to do what only he can. Can we trust him enough to believe he can take our time, our money, our talents and energies, our loves and skills, even our shortcomings, and use them to bless the world in ways we may not begin to understand?

So, the money which you give prayerfully to charities or to Church; the support you give to friends and strangers in need; the time you give to making it possible for others to feel welcome and accepted; everything you do out of love and compassion, though it costs you: think of these things as loaves and fishes given to the Lord for him to bless, to break, and to use for the healing of a hungry world.



You may never see what God is able to do with what you offer Him; nor will what you can give Him solve all the world's hunger. Many people in Jesus' day still went hungry. Many still suffered injustice – as did he. The loaves and fish did not instantly satisfy all the world's hungers. But they did give a glimpse of

the generosity of God, His abundance, and His longing to see His children provided for.

I think Jesus' challenge to you and me today is this: will we allow our hearts to feel something of the heartache of God for His hungry world? Will we allow that heartache to move us to pray? When we pray, will we be willing to be part of the answer, offering our loaves and fishes – our time, money, talents, passions and even our failings – to Christ for his use, even if it costs us? And will we confidently trust in our compassionate, generous God to use them in



His own time and way, to go towards satisfying the hunger of His children?

The world is hungry – for food, for justice, for a sense of meaning and belonging. "Give me your loaves and your fish," Jesus says, "and together we can begin to feed it."
