### **INTRODUCTION**

*It's a very special day today and the start of a very special week – today's the day when Jesus borrows a donkey and rides into Jerusalem, with everyone cheering and crowds surging to catch a glimpse of him. All over the world Christians are waving palm branches today – some might even have a real donkey to process round with. But since all the donkeys I know of are booked out for today – we'll just have to make do!*

Let us go with him in faith and love, so that, united with him in his sufferings, we may share his risen life.

**Let all Israel repeat:**


**"His faithful love endures forever."**

### **GOSPEL READING**

#### **JOHN 12.12-16**

Hear the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to John  
**Glory to you, O Lord.**

The next day the great crowd that had come to the festival heard that Jesus was coming to Jerusalem. So they took branches of palm trees and went out to meet him, shouting "Hosanna! Blessed is the one who comes in the name of the Lord- the King of Israel!"

Jesus found a young donkey and sat on it; as it is written:

"Do not be afraid, daughter of Zion. Look, your king is coming, sitting on a donkey's colt!"



His disciples did not understand these things at first; but when Jesus was glorified, then they remembered that these things had been written of him and had been done to him.

This is the Gospel of the Lord.

**REFLECTION (by Margaret Mandrell)**

When I was 21, I travelled to Israel, and was in Jerusalem during the Easter festival. I will always remember the pilgrims in procession, singing with joy and expectation, praising God in different languages, representing very varied



cultures and ethnic groups. The noise, the excitement, the colour, the vibrancy all added to the overwhelming nature of the experience. It was awe inspiring to walk in the footsteps of our Saviour, to visit the places where he had ministered.

By the time Jesus entered Jerusalem, he had upset every vested interest, and challenged the established leaders of the Jewish faith. He had reached out to the poor and the marginalised, showing them the kingdom of God, and their place in it. He spoke out against the hypocrisy of the Pharisees, and the elitist Sadducees, who controlled the Temple, and dominated the ruling council. Some thought that Rome was about to be overthrown, others that Jesus would become their king, and some, that he was indeed the long-expected Messiah. The sense of anticipation must have been tangible within the throng of believers, the curious, the sceptical, and the observers.

Jean Vanier says "Our human hearts need something beyond the limitations and frustrations of the daily grind. We thirst for a happiness which seems unattainable on earth. We crave the infinite, the universal, the eternal – something which gives a sense to human life and its irksome daily routines. A festival is a sign of heaven. It symbolizes our deepest aspiration – an experience of total communion."

I have always found comfort in the words which speak of God's love and compassion "For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him may not perish but may have eternal life." The message of the gospel is one of acceptance and love, of forgiveness, restoration and relationship. God loves, accepts and cares for each one of his children. The Bible is a story of love, of God reaching out to people in order to restore a relationship with them. We are reassured that God is a "compassionate and gracious God, slow to anger and abounding in love and faithfulness, maintaining love to thousands, and forgiving wickedness, rebellion and sin."

In Acts we have the story of the growth of the Church after Pentecost, the spreading of the gospel, the good news, throughout the Roman world. It is the account of Jesus' followers, inspired by the Holy Spirit, reaching out to share the message of hope and new life through the life, death and resurrection of Jesus. The gospel messengers were not educated or trained but were enthusiastic in sharing the story of the transforming power of the kingdom of God.

This story, our personal journey of faith, is the same today, and is based on trust, faith and obedience. We have hope for the future and are privileged to live in the light of eternity.

The church, particularly in the last year, has had to find new ways of reaching out to people, and many have encountered the gospel message through social media. Those who would have been reluctant to enter a church building have heard the gospel and have encountered God's love through his people. This has been a time when isolation and fear have increased, when anxiety levels have risen, and death has become very real for many.



We, as followers of Christ, can pray for those who are struggling, we can offer support through telephone calls or socially distanced visits, we can shop for neighbours, and we can show God's love through our actions and words. We may not be able to celebrate Palm Sunday as we would like to, but we are assured of God's presence with us, and can experience the joy of knowing we are part of God's family, each one of us a precious child of our loving heavenly Father.

## **RESPONDING TO THE WORD**

Let us affirm our faith in Jesus Christ the Son of God.

**Though he was divine,  
he did not cling to equality with God,  
but made himself nothing.**
