INTRODUCTION TO TODAY'S SERVICE

The Church's celebration of Easter may have been more subdued again this year, as social distancing prevents us from sharing fellowship as we would like to, and the pandemic is far from over. But the message of Easter hope has never been more needed. Today's readings remind us how that hope changes lives. We hear the uplifting account of the believers who were of one heart and soul, testifying to the resurrection of the Lord Jesus. We will also hear the account of Thomas' encounter with the risen Christ and what that means for us as believers.

As followers of Christ, we too, are called to share the story.
And to keep on sharing the story of our risen Lord Jesus.

Otherwise, as St Paul asked, 'How can people hear about him unless someone tells them?'

GOSPEL READING

John 20.19-31 (NRSV)

Hear the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to John
Glory to you, O Lord.

When it was evening on that day, the first day of the week, and the doors of the house where the disciples had met were locked for fear of the Jews, Jesus came and stood among them and said, "Peace be with you." After he said this, he showed them his hands and his side. Then the disciples rejoiced when they saw the Lord. Jesus said to them again, "Peace be with you. As the Father has sent me, so I send you." When he had said this, he breathed on them and said to them, "Receive the Holy Spirit. If you forgive the sins of any, they are forgiven them; if you retain the sins of any, they are retained.

But Thomas (who was called the Twin), one of the twelve, was not with them when Jesus came. So the other disciples told him, "We have seen the Lord." But he said to them, "Unless I see the mark of the nails in his hands, and put my finger in the mark of the nails and my hand in his side, I will not believe."

A week later his disciples were again in the house, and Thomas was with them. Although the doors were shut, Jesus came and stood among them and said, "Peace be with you." Then he said to Thomas, "Put your finger here and see my hands. Reach out your hand and put it in my side. Do not doubt but believe." Thomas answered him, "My Lord and my God!" Jesus said to him, "Have you believed because you have

seen me? Blessed are those who have not seen and yet have come to believe.

Now Jesus did many other signs in the presence of his disciples, which are not written in this book. But these are written so that you may come to believe that Jesus is the Messiah, the Son of God, and that through believing you may have life in his name.

This is the Gospel of the Lord

REFLECTION (by Margaret Mandrell)

My car is now 11 years old, and the battery was causing concern. Would this be the time when the car would not start? How easy would it be to replace an 11 year old battery? Last week I finally bought a new one and had it fitted. What a transformation! The car is running beautifully. I had not realised that there had been a progressive decline in performance. This may be an unusual place to begin thinking about the gospel message, however, just as my battery was failing to adequately perform, after the last year, many are feeling similarly worn out. Many people have found this last enforced lock down very hard and are longing for a return to what was previously enjoyed as a normal part of life.

The disciples were together, fearful of the Jews, and the risen Jesus appeared bringing hope and peace to them. He gave the gift of the Holy Spirit to them and transformed their fear to faith.

Then we have the account of Thomas, absent when Jesus appeared, and doubting the reality of his presence. Jesus entered the room a week later and spoke to Thomas directly. Thomas then acknowledged him and believed. I always feel sorry for Thomas, the doubter, remembered for 2000 years in this way, rather than for his confession of faith "My Lord and my God".

In a book called "Celebrating the Saints" there is a reading by Gregory the Great which talks of divine mercy and how by touching the wounded flesh he, Thomas, healed the wound of our unbelief as well as his own. Gregory says, "Thomas' scepticism was more advantageous to us than was the faith of the other disciples who believed. When he was led to faith by actually touching Jesus, our hearts were relieved of all doubt, for our faith is made whole." Thomas should be remembered as a witness to the reality of the resurrection – the one who recognised the reality of the man and testified that he was the invisible God.

These same disciples went on to spread the gospel courageously throughout the Roman world, and to create new

ways of living together and being, which greatly influenced the society in which they lived. They went from being fearful to proclaiming the risen Christ to whoever was willing to listen. They lived in community, sharing what they had, and were full of the Holy Spirit.

“There is no ideal community. Community is made up of people with all their richness, but also their weakness and poverty, of people who accept and forgive each other, who are vulnerable with each other. Humility and trust are more at the foundation of community than perfection.”

“A community is only being created when its members accept that they are not going to achieve great things, that they are not going to be heroes, but simply live each day with new hope, like children, in wonderment as the sun rises and in thanksgiving as it sets. Community is only being created when they have recognized that the greatness of man is to accept his insignificance, his human condition and his earth, and to thank God for having put in a finite body the seeds of eternity which are visible in small and daily gestures of love and forgiveness. The beauty of man is in this fidelity to the wonder of each day.”
