INTRODUCTION



"Teacher, don't you care that we're going to drown?!"

Jesus' calming of the storm is a well-known story. The geography of the Sea of Galilee means that it is prone to sudden, violent windstorms, and the disciples have been caught in one while

making a boat crossing. Even the professional fishermen are sure they are about to die. And Jesus – who took them there in the first place – is fast asleep.

Don't you care that we're drowning? How often have you felt like crying out something similar to God? Where is God when you need him? Doesn't he care? How many people have felt like that during the past year? Perhaps you feel like that right now?

Jesus' response to the disciples' crying out to him does not answer all their questions: in fact, it leaves them with an even bigger one: *"Who is this whom even the wind and waves obey?"* But the experience of learning to trust Jesus in the storm moves them deeper into an understanding that the God who created and sustains this awe-inspiring universe is not absent from the storms of life, but right there with us, inviting us to trust him more.

Spend a moment now to allow God's peace to still whatever storms (or even light turbulence!) are troubling you today, and to reaffirm your trust in him.

As God's partners, we beg you not to accept this marvellous gift of God's kindness and then ignore it. For God says,

"At just the right time, I heard you.

On the day of salvation, I helped you."

Indeed, the "right time" is now. Today is the day of salvation.

We live in such a way that no one will stumble because of us, and no one will find fault with our ministry. In everything we do, we show that we are true ministers of God. We patiently endure troubles and hardships and calamities of every kind. We have been beaten, been put in prison, faced angry mobs, worked to exhaustion, endured sleepless nights, and gone without food. We

prove ourselves by our purity, our understanding, our patience, our kindness, by the Holy Spirit within us, and by our sincere love. We faithfully preach the truth. God's power is working in us. We use the weapons of righteousness in the right hand for attack and the left hand for defence. We serve God whether people honour us or despise us, whether they slander us or praise us. We are honest, but they call us impostors. We are ignored, even though we are well known. We live close to death, but we are still alive. We have been beaten, but we have not been killed. Our hearts ache, but we always have joy. We are poor, but we give spiritual riches to others. We own nothing, and yet we have everything.

Oh, dear Corinthian friends! We have spoken honestly with you, and our hearts are open to you. There is no lack of love on our part, but you have withheld your love from us. I am asking you to respond as if you were my own children. Open your hearts to us!

Mark 4:35-41 (New Living Translation)

Hear the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Mark.


Glory to you, O Lord.

When Jesus woke up, he rebuked the wind and said to the waves, "Silence! Be still!" Suddenly the wind stopped, and there was a great calm. Then he asked them, "Why are you afraid? Do you still have no faith?"

The disciples were absolutely terrified. "Who is this man?" they asked each other. "Even the wind and waves obey him!"

REFLECTION (by Margaret Mandrell)

When I was a teenager, we went for a holiday to Loch Awe, and my friend and I decided to go rowing on the loch. It was a stormy day, with waves and a strong wind, and we had a scary and difficult time trying to make progress, as we fought against the current to return to safety. For a long period of time we made no headway, becoming more tired and anxious as we battled the elements. Some-how we got back to shore, and a lesson was learnt. We recognised our frailty and limitations, but that feeling of vulnerability and fear has never been forgotten.

In life, as frail human beings, we often have this type of experience, as we strive to cope with difficult and challenging circumstances. We plough on, perhaps feeling too busy to take time for God, and struggle in our own strength, feeling tired and discouraged. On an inter-faith charity ride, an author was in the Swiss mountains, cycling over 100 kilometres a day, exhausted, and battling against a headwind. A companion suggested she ride in his slipstream. The effect was dramatic, as the wind resistance was reduced by 30%. The healing respite allowed her to recover physically and psychologically. She noted that at first everyone was feeling alone and afraid

of failure, but that when they relied on each other, the effect was transformational.

The disciples were probably exhausted, after a day spent with crowds of people, curious, questioning, seeking healing and answers. They set sail from the shore to the other side of the lake. A violent storm with gale force winds threatened to sink the boat. Jesus slept, despite the tumult of wind and waves. Jesus was woken up, and he calmly addressed the turbulent elements, bringing about a state of calm, and showing his followers that he had great power.

The gospels show us that constant connection with those who are in need, in body or spirit, those who are longing for relief, those who are outsiders. Jesus



always provided a healing space where the weary and worn out, the sad and the excluded, could find restoration and wholeness. Jesus reached out and touched the untouchable, those disfigured by leprosy, those considered unclean, the despised and rejected. His unconditional love and acceptance transformed people, allowing them to become whole. The disciples misunderstood him and let him down, but he gave them opportunities to grow and mature in faith. He treated everyone as someone having infinite worth and healed their brokenness.

We too can lift and support those who are struggling against storms and trials, those who feel overwhelmed and ignored. We can do this by listening with attention, by remembering a name, where someone is on their journey, by valuing them as an individual. We can offer to pray for or with them, share in their pain and loss and listen to their story. We can share the story of God's love and forgiveness and demonstrate this love to those who are in need. We, as Christians, can experience the peace which knowing we are loved and part of God's family can give, so that even if we are going through a difficult experience we can still be upheld and comforted by this knowledge.

Sometimes the words of a hymn can give comfort and lift our spirits, and when prayer is difficult, they can say what we are struggling to express. We can be encouraged in our walk of faith by the example of those who have

gone before. As a child I learned "Turn your eyes upon Jesus, look full in his wonderful face, and the things of earth will grow strangely dim, in the light of his glory and grace." We can choose to accept the gracious love of God, and to rest in his presence, so that whatever happens, we too can know his peace which passes understanding. This peace will sustain us when things are difficult and threaten to overwhelm us.
