### **INTRODUCTION**

This week's readings ought perhaps to come with some kind of hazard warning, since they make it clear that walking God's way is not for the faint hearted. Anyone who thinks that the life of Christian discipleship somehow protects us from any harm or adversity would do well to reconsider. If anything – walking God's way sometimes feels even harder than for those who don't. You only have to look at some of the psalms to realise this; the psalmist cries out "Why, O Lord, do you stand far off? Why do you hide yourself in times of trouble?" (*Psalms 10*)

Many times in the bible and in reality for us; those who speak out for God or for those without a voice find themselves rejected, ridiculed, imprisoned - or worse still, put to death. The prophet Amos was told to clear off and go back to his farming because people didn't want to hear his message from God. When St. Paul writes to the various churches he makes no bones of the fact that he is persecuted for his faith. And because God's way might seem so counter-cultural to the lives that many lead today – it can be difficult to speak out or speak up.

As Christians we sometimes need a bit of courage to speak up for God in a world that seems indifferent or resistant. So as

you come to worship this morning, give thanks for the people that you have heard speak up for God. And if you're not feeling terribly courageous – offer that to God too.

### **GOSPEL READING**

#### **Mark 6:14-29 (New Revised Standard Version)**

Hear the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Mark.  
**Glory to you, O Lord.**

King Herod heard of it, for Jesus' name had become known. Some were saying, "John the baptizer has been raised from the dead; and for this reason these powers are at work in him." But others said, "It is Elijah." And others said, "It is a prophet, like one of the prophets of old." But when Herod heard of it, he said, "John, whom I beheaded, has been raised."

For Herod himself had sent men who arrested John, bound him, and put him in prison on account of Herodias, his brother Philip's wife, because Herod had married her. For John had been telling Herod, "It is not lawful for you to have your brother's wife." And Herodias had a grudge against him, and wanted to kill him. But she could not, for Herod feared John, knowing that he was a righteous and holy man, and he protected him. When he heard him, he was greatly perplexed; and yet he liked to listen to him.

But an opportunity came when Herod on his birthday gave a banquet for his courtiers and officers and for the leaders of Galilee. When his daughter Herodias came in and danced, she pleased Herod and his guests; and the king said to the girl, "Ask me for whatever you wish, and I will give it." And he solemnly swore to her, "Whatever you ask me, I will give you, even half of my kingdom."

She went out and said to her mother, "What should I ask for?" She replied, "The head of John the baptizer." Immediately she rushed back to the king and requested, "I want you to give me at once the head of John the Baptist on a platter."

The king was deeply grieved; yet out of regard for his oaths and for the guests, he did not want to refuse her. Immediately the king sent a soldier of the guard with orders to bring John's head. He went and beheaded him in the prison, brought his head on a platter, and gave it to the girl. Then the girl gave it to her mother. When his disciples heard about it, they came and took his body, and laid it in a tomb.

This is the Gospel of the Lord.

### **REFLECTION (by Richard Wood)**

The infamous story of Salome's Dance and the Beheading of John the Baptist is perhaps one of the juiciest pieces of gossip in the Bible - a story of infidelity, family intrigue, royal gossip, glamorous parties, dignitaries, sex, oaths, politics, hatred, power plays and a terrible end for John.

This is the kind of big story that sells newspapers! Even Jesus, when he hears this piece of earth-shattering news, is rocked by it. But this is not the big story for Mark.

Amongst the intrigue, the sex, the power plays of the rich and the powerful, we find at the edges the story of a preacher. This preacher didn't seem to know what was good for him when he crossed Herod and his wife Herodias, berating them for their sinful relationship.

Who do you most associate with in this story? I asked myself this question and started with John before realising that I am not really in the mould of an Old Testament Prophet, I've never worn a camel hair shirt, I have never been in quite such a position of jeopardy as John was here, and, as I'm preaching this message to you today, certainly not to the point of death! I don't think any of us would immediately pick Herod. Yet, Herod's story, as I considered it, began to sound uncomfortably familiar.

Herod, we are told, was "greatly perplexed" at hearing John, but liked to listen to his preaching nonetheless. Herod knew the voice of God in John, found it compelling and yet could not quite bring himself to follow this voice. Instead, he kept the preacher captive.

We may hear our own inner preacher from time to time and will, we all hope, immediately and unquestioningly follow that voice - the voice of God - in our lives. Yet there are occasions when our reaction might sound more like Herod's - we hear the voice but cannot bring ourselves to ditch our earthly

treasures in order to follow. Instead we live in denial, shut the voice away, bury it in some deep dungeon whilst we wrestle with our soul.

I don't want to sound overdramatic here, but sometimes it is only by grace that we ever heard this voice at all. Maybe we are all closer to Herod than we think, and perhaps our earthly desires, the treasures we claim as our own, have the power to silence our inner preacher if we allow them to dance in our lives.

Some years ago, I moved my family over to the USA to a job promising sack-loads of money. I moved from a job that was tough to do, not least financially, but which was really rewarding and I had very clearly been directed to by my inner preacher some years before. And, if I'm honest, my inner preacher did not like this new move at all. In fact I'd go as far as to say that God warned me not to take this job. I systematically ignored these warnings. The consequences were perhaps predictable. 'Long-story-short', It was an unmitigated disaster that cost years of life.

I often consider this disaster to have been the Grace of God though - after all God could simply have left me to go to build my own little kingdom, and the end of that story would be a good deal sorrier.

The proverbs tell us that “Just as the grave is never full, so human eyes are never satisfied,” (Prov 27:20). Death and destruction come to everything in an earthly kingdom. Herod did indeed build his own kingdom - completed the life-time project of his father, the Temple in Jerusalem, only to be himself exiled to Gaul and for the magnificent Temple of Herod to be destroyed some years later by the Romans with, as Jesus predicted, “not one stone left standing on another”. It remains true that the kingdoms we build with our own hands, in which we shut away the preacher, are destined to die. The danger is that in not letting go of our treasures, we preside over a dying kingdom destined for destruction.

As I reflect on this uncomfortable truth, I wonder who is the real captive in this story? John or Herod? Herod, for all his self-indulgence, lusts, power plays and attempts to gratify his own wishes, was unable to satisfy himself, even as ruler of an earthly kingdom and found himself captive to it, compelled to do things he did not want to do. Most sadly of all, Herod did not recognise Jesus when he finally came to meet him on Good Friday – he could not hear the voice of the preacher. The preacher was already dead in his own heart, beheaded with John the Baptist.

The theologian Walter Brueggemann writes in his book *Preaching: The Word Militant* that preaching is risky, specifically that it is foolish, dangerous and exposing for the

preacher. No Biblical example, save perhaps Jesus himself, demonstrates this better than John’s death. He never shied away from his calling despite the obvious danger.

Preaching the Kingdom of God is not for the faint-hearted but that is exactly what we are called to if we are followers of Jesus. We don’t need to be and Old Testament style prophets. In fact, we may not be great preachers of the word, but we do preach with our lives every day, and if our lives do not match up, our words mean little anyway. St Francis famously said: “Preach the Gospel at all times and where possible use words”.

It is by the grace of God that we hear the words of the inner preacher. It is our choice whether we live out those words. If we follow the commission of Jesus to “Go into all the world and preach the Gospel to all creation” (Mk 16:15), then we must also learn to let go of our treasures, something Herod could never quite do, and be prepared for the risks involved, inspired by John the Baptist.
